PASTOR'S PEN

Nowadays we hear people say they can't wait to get back to "normal" when they can go about their business as "usual." Randy didn't write this month but you could almost think he wrote this 2002 message last week:

A NORMAL DAY

Perhaps you have found yourself longing for a "normal day." In many ways that means a desire to have things go as planned. It may include the kids sleeping through the night, no one being sick, having hot water for the shower, finding milk in the refrigerator, the car starting, avoiding traffic jams, the computer working properly, receiving no emergency phone calls....and more could be added to the list.

As I thought about this, two things came to mind. First, every day many things do go well that we never pause to think about. Second, and more important, our idea of the normal leaves little room for God (except, that is, for God to make things go normally). For example, the other night I had trouble sleeping. While it was frustrating, I also sensed God speaking to me about many things that were on my mind. Though tired, I actually felt energized and grateful for the experience. The next night, as I hoped for a "normal" night's sleep, I began to think of the many experiences of our faith that do not fit into the "normal" category. It is not normal to hear God speak from a burning bush. It is not normal for people to survive being thrown into a furnace. It is not normal for walls of a city to fall down. It is not normal for the God of the universe to be born to human parents. It is not normal to feed 5,000 people with the lunch of one boy. It is not normal for one to be raised from the dead. It is not normal for people to speak in other languages. It is not normal to be filled with the Spirit of God!



Get the picture? Our faith is not normal. We frequently encounter the living God outside our understanding of normal. It may be in a chance encounter with another person, or it may be through a phone call that we received only because we were running fifteen minutes late. How might God be calling us to leave the "normal" behind. Perhaps the very thing that we declare is not normal may be the opportunity in which God wants us to take risks for ministry. Sure, life needs some predictability. We need that which we call "normal" but we must also remember that our God is not limited to the ordinary or the normal.

The next time your day or night does not go as planned, ask, "Is God trying to say something?" How might God be acting or communicating to you outside the normal routine of life?

May God bless you with other than a "normal" day!

FROM THE LIBRARY


Review of the book, <u>THIS IS GOD'S TABLE</u> by Anna Woofenden

The author weaves a wonderful true story of her childhood, her heritage of the Swedenborgian Church and how she followed God's leading to Southern California. Anna found several people who took on her vision of an unconventional church located on an empty lot, except for litter, a sagging fence and 12 foot tall metal dinosaur!

After months of praying & planning, they became a "church". Digging in the dirt, collecting the litter, pulling weeds & planting a garden they began praying & blessing one another and breaking bread together. So the people came, as they watched Anna & her friends "plant a garden church": a young Chacano barber, the cranky old Croatian lady, the shady real estate agent, a hopeless drunk and the afflicted single Mother. Anna includes the stark reality of life and the intense challenge of "finding church beyond the walls". The people came as they saw a place where they could all be healed of their brokenness. Eventually, because all found acceptance, were blessed by each other as well as by Anna, this "church" filled the needs of each as they all contributed, in some way, to find nourishment for their souls.

This is a book every Christian should read to get a glimpse of what the future church could look like. It helps us discover that there is enough right under our feet to make a church together, and God can bless even the wildest ideas!
