PASTOR'S PEN: Welcoming the Unexpected?

We are beginning a season of Advent, a season marked by waiting, a reminder to celebrate the historical birth of Jesus but also to anticipate the second coming of Christ back to earth. The name Advent comes from the Latin "adventus" meaning "coming." The historical birth of Jesus was prophesied with many promises about his coming and what that would mean for the world, especially God's chosen people.

Isaiah 9:2-7, is a prophecy about the Messiah, who is called "Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." These words give hope for a Messiah who would bring peace and justice to the world. We are still waiting for the complete fulfillment of these promises. It is hard to wait when we live in a world that seems increasingly filled with war and trouble of many kinds. Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "Waiting is an art that our impatient age has forgotten," a quote written in the 1940s while he was in prison. Perhaps our impatience has grown since

then! It can be hard to wait for the fulfillment of God's promises, especially if we have difficulty seeing and welcoming the coming of Christ in all the unexpected ways that Christ may be showing up. I think about the very unexpected way Christ came to earth as a baby, to a young unwed girl, probably still a teenager. I think about the upheaval in Joseph's life as he took on the responsibility of naming and parenting Jesus, having to escape to Egypt. All unexpected and not planned, but nevertheless, it opened the door for all of us to experience the salvation offered by Jesus. This past year our family was given the unexpected news of a coming baby to Rebecca, our daughter. I remember the day I received the news and the flood of emotions I felt. As time went on I was able to share the news with trusted friends and family and we anticipated the arrival of a new family member with joy and love. We are now very grateful for the life of Grace and we wonder how God will fulfill his purposes in her life. When we face the unexpected, we are often caught off guard and not sure how God is at work.

As Jesus was born into his family and grew up, I imagine there were many unexpected events along the way, leading to his death and resurrection. I wonder if Mary especially felt some of the tension of not knowing what would happen next?

Here in this current season of Advent, we are invited to wait and look for the coming of Christ in unexpected ways. What are the ways that you have experienced Christ coming to you and your circumstances in the past that were unexpected, but brought hope and transformation? We may not always welcome the unexpected, but what does it look like to have a welcoming heart open to Christ in the surprising ways Christ may come to us?

As we continue in the season of Advent, may we each grow in our awareness of the amazing ways God breaks into this waiting world and shines the light of his love to all.

Book review: Hope Heals by Katherine & Jay Wolf

This is a true story of overwhelming loss and an overcoming love. This couple had big dreams: Jay was almost thru law school and Katherine just had a baby boy, now 6 months old. Without warning, Katherine suffered a massive brain stem stroke. Family, church and community helped this young couple by caring for their baby, bringing meals, doing housework and encouraging them to trust God and walk with Him.

After being in the hospital for two months (and having surgery that eventually added up to 11 different procedures) Katherine was moved to an inpatient facility for intensive brain rehabilitation and PT. It was a long time before she could swallow real food. One of her biggest disappointments was Thanksgiving Day, Katherine's favorite holiday. She sat in their living room in a wheelchair while everyone else celebrated by cooking or playing with her son. She wondered if God made a mistake. Should she have died? Suddenly, Katherine felt a deep awakening. God met her in the messiness of her life and a new determination, called HOPE.

One day at a time, Jay and Katherine learned, not to hang out in a place of fear, but to cling to something meaningful beyond anything you know or understand. That happened, and Hope Healed.

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
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
