PASTOR'S PEN

"Waiting on God in a hurried world"

As the new year begins, fresh opportunities abound. I want to encourage us to consider the opportunity we have to transform a common and often dreaded daily occurrence. Think of something you enjoy doing. What is it that you find energizing? What if you transfer that attitude and excitement to waiting? I readily confess that the next time I look forward to waiting will be the first time. However, I seriously plan to give it a try.

Our theme for 2020 is waiting on God in a hurried world. While I look forward to preaching on this theme, I want to suggest a few simple practices to enhance our experience of waiting. What if we saw waiting as an opportunity to connect with God? Instead of growing impatient or frustrated over the need to wait, intentionally using the time afforded us when we wait to pray could prove beneficial.

The following are some practical examples to consider. When waiting for a person, pray for that person to know that he/she is deeply loved by God. Pray for God to fill that person with God's grace. When waiting to go somewhere or for an event to begin consider praying that God will prepare you to hear/experience God in the moment.

There are times we wait for news whether it be a text response, phone call or a report from a professional. In such times it may be helpful to pray that God would prepare us to hear the news trusting in God. Perhaps when we check our phone for a response, we can offer a simple prayer asking God to help us trust in God's goodness and grace as we wait.

Finally, when we encounter people or situations when we feel forced to wait unnecessarily may be the perfect time to pray that God create in us a clean heart and renew a right spirit within us. For example, when going through the fast grocery line for 10 items or less and the person in front of us has 16 items. When driving and people fail to understand the sign saying slower traffic keep right. If this is not a struggle for you, please feel free to pray for me that God would renew a right spirit within me.

I have tried to provide several practical suggestions how to use our waiting to connect with God. Just maybe, our waiting can be transformed to a positive experience. As I look forward to this year, perhaps I will discover the joy of waiting. Do you care to join me in waiting?

FROM THE PRAYER CORNER

Waiting on God in a hurried world is our theme for this year. It can be difficult to wait, and sometimes we may not even know what we are waiting for. Or we may not want to say it aloud because of fear of what others might say.

This year I want to encourage us as a congregation to invite the prayer ushers to pray with you about what is keeping you in a waiting posture right now in your life. The prayer ushers will not give you advice or answers, but simply pray for you as you name your concern. The prayer ushers will keep it confidential and will not follow-up with you. Remember they are available every Sunday during our morning worship service.

Another opportunity to name our waiting posture is to visit the upstairs prayer room and use it as a resource this year, learning to sit in the stillness for a few minutes or to post a sticky note on the bulletin board with your concern. The upstairs prayer room is ideal for a personal quiet time with God and once again a calendar will be posted outside the room to reserve a time slot.

May we as a congregation learn to trust God more fully as we wait.

There is no gardening right now, so how about a book or two from the church library. You might consider:

Surviving Henry, Adventures in Loving a Canine Catastrophe by Erin Taylor Young. She begins by saying that "Henry is the anti-dog. I don't believe in divine misprints. But life with Henry makes me wonder." They finally find a place to board Henry at K9 University (where he had almost flunked his obedience lessons) while they travel to visit relatives over the holidays. She goes to retrieve Henry and talks to Angel at K9. She sees dollar signs for the damage when Angel reports that somehow Henry got out of his kennel and training area and into the store area (which set off a police alarm). Angel said that Henry recognized him at the door, "and his whole body started wriggling and wagging like I was his best friend... The store was trashed... He pulled every single thing he could reach off the wall.

Chewed it, ate it, played with it, mangled it. *Everything*. All over the floor. Literally." This book is good for anyone who needs to laugh but especially for those who have raised and trained puppies.

Invited, the Power of Hospitality in an Age of Loneliness by Leslie Verner. The author learned about hospitality from her parents and her time in China, Uganda and other countries. Her stories help redefine hospitality; it is less about entertaining and more about being a good neighbor. She says there is power in a simple invitation. Leslie offers some ideas for offering hospitality no matter our age or situation in life. She includes ideas for inviting neighbors, church or community people, and "friends and soon-to-be friends." One of her tips for uncertain hosts is, "If you have food, people will come." She also reminds us that "people are more significant than the environment, food, or cleanliness of the home." Let's invite someone soon.
