PASTOR'S PEN

I do not recall exactly when, but sometime when our children were young we played the arcade game Whacka-mole. For those who do not know the game, I confess it is not very Anabaptist. As the title suggests, one is encouraged to hit moles on the head as they pop up. The more one hits the faster the moles appear. Sometimes it seems life can feel like that game with fear being the mole that continues to pop up faster each day.

Naturally there is the fear of Covid and connected to that is the fear of Covid's impact on the economy. As I listen to people, the moles of fear are as plentiful as the stars. The following is a short list of what I have heard in the past week.

- From a church leader—fear people will not come back to church
- From a mother—fear my adult child will cut me off
- From an individual—fear that our country will no longer be Christian
- From an church elder—fear others will not like our decision
- From a father—fear I am no longer of any value to my family

The resurrected Jesus' message to his disciples was "Fear not." Throughout the Old and New Testament when the presence of God appeared, frequently the call was to fear not. Jesus taught that love casts out fear. The song writer Zach Williams declares in a song that "fear he is a liar". A part of the chorus in that song states "He will take your breath, rob you of your rest, steal your happiness and stop you in your steps." I wonder are finding fear doing those very things and more. I would add that fear paralyzes us away from trusting God and stops us from risk changing. Fear also stops us from reaching out in love to others who look, think, act, or believe different than us.

I do not know of anyone who ever had a perfect score in Whack-a-mole. Similarly, each of us face daily challenges/invitations to believe the lies spoken by fear. Rather than hitting trying to beat down the fear we encounter, may we spend time in the presence of the resurrected Jesus who declares my peace I give to you. When fearful, rather than turning to news sources, social media, or conversations with friends may we quiet ourselves before God and ask for His presence to fill us anew.

Seems like waiting on God is the very focus we need in 2020. Do not be discouraged if you seem to fail in your struggle with fear. Persevere in the struggle and God will win! Please feel free to take the opportunity to reach out to a praying friend let them pray for you in this battle.

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FROM THE LIBRARY


<u>Dangerous Journeys to Freedom</u> from Richland Library Company.

This is a collection of stories of Latvian Baptist families who immigrated from Europe to Applebachsville and Quakertown, PA. Most of the stories were told by the persons who actually experienced the events. The Latvian Baptist Church has some similarities to our Mennonite migrations also. Latvia was in the cross-fire of attempts at domination by Russia and Germany, each wanting to use their seaports and lands/people for their own ends. Many people died and others escaped. Their journey was hazardous, difficult and sometimes delayed or lengthy. Some families had come to the U.S. in the early 1900s and had a small church in the Applebachsville area. This Baptist Church was revived as the families who emigrated to escape Russian and German domination came to this area in the 1940s.

One woman described her first house in Applebachsville. "Their household consisted of two elderly grandparents, a widowed mother with a factory job, and two girls. Money was scarce. The 2-story house we purchased in Applebachsville on old Bethlehem Road in 1951 had no running water (cistern), no bathroom (outhouse), no central heat (oil-burner in the dining room), and it felt like no insulation had been used (cold!)." They had no car, phone, TV or bicycle. Her mother had managed to bring a sewing machine which was a God-send as she could sew for the family. She talked about the Latvian church in Applebachsville being not only a spiritual home but a social center and a cultural haven. They sent packages back to Latvia. Some parcels never reached their destination and others had items confiscated. In one case an old coat was substituted for the donated one.

Another similarity to our Christian upbringing was choral singing. Ralf W. Augstroze, Superintendent and Chairman of the Board, Bucks County Latvian Baptist Church presented a history of Latvians in Haycock Township to the Heacock Historical Society on October 21, 2007. He mentions that "our church worship services continue to this day in the Latvian language, which was also my, my wife's and my children's first language." It is amazing to think that families who had immigrated in the 40s still retained and used their Latvian tongue in 2017. Apparently many of the songs they sang have not been translated into English.

Many of the people had jobs at farms and businesses in and around Quakertown, and the children graduated from Quakertown High. There are many photos of people and buildings which add so much to the readability of this amazing history of another group of God's people.



SEPARATED WORSHIP

During the last few months we have been separated in several ways during our worship time. For weeks we only had our computer or phone to watch the video of a service led by KrisAnne and Randy or Sandy. Later we had the option of driving to church afterward to meet at the pavilion for fellowship and a short prayer time. Finally, on June 28 we had the first service in our building! Inside, we wore masks and were seated in the marked spots scattered through the room. With electronic assistance, the service was also available to those watching online. You really can sing with a mask on your face! Afterward, there was water provided for a time to visit outside. It is good to be present with each other.
