PASTOR'S PEN

A few days ago I was speaking with a person who was walking her dog. As we talked, she instructed her dog to sit next to her. What caught me by surprise was that she used her first language of Spanish rather than English when speaking to her dog. I said your dog understands Spanish and she replied "actually, he is bilingual." As I reflected on this experience, I found it interesting that I assumed she would speak English to her dog even though I know Spanish is used in her home. This reinforced a thought that has been rolling in my head the past few months that one expression of Christian humility is to increase our capacity to listen.

Christian humility has often been limited or defined by not being "showy". We have all heard not to brag or call attention to self. At times humility is seen as deferring to others. I encourage us to expand our understanding and most of all our practice of humility. I believe becoming more intent on listening can increase our humility. I am convinced that as we increase our practice of humility we naturally draw closer to God and one another. I want to encourage the following three listening practices in order to increase our humility.

The first one is to listen with the intent to understand the other person. Often our listening is limited by our need to be understood rather than to understand the other. In such cases we interrupt to share our opinion/perspective and often fail to understand the other person. When we listen to understand the other person, we will ask questions of clarification which often may reveal intent. While we still may not agree with the other person, often when we more clearly understand the intent of the other we can respond with more compassion and understanding.

The second practice is to listen without needing to correct, advise or fix the other person. It has often been said that a dog is one's best friend. I remember more than one conversation with my dog as a teenager in which my spirits were lifted by the faithful listening companionship of my dog. While that was good, I have experienced much greater hope when a person has given me the blessing of compassionate listening without any words that made me feel like a project to be fixed. The humility side of this is to both trust that God is at work and that the other person is capable. How might God be inviting you to listen to another person as the one and only goal of the conversation? After listening, privately asking for God to be with and guide the person is always appropriate.

The third practice is to listen without defending. The Bible is full of encouragement to let God exact vengeance. I interpret that to suggest we can trust God to protect and defend our image. If we are doing what we know God desires when others attack or misunderstand us we can trust God to bring that to light in God's timing and God's way. However, humility would admit that we all struggle and fall short of God's and even our own intent at times. Therefore, God's grace empowers us to take a different path. Rather than defend our actions we can seek and listen what God wants of us. Confession and repentance may be the new path most needed.

Are you willing to increase your listening as a way to express humility? I encourage each one to seek God's direction how to try one or all of the above. Practice listening as an expression of humility as a way to trust God's promise. "Humble yourself in the sight of the Lord and He will lift you up!"

Cooking project



FROM THE LIBRARY: Deliver the Ransom Alone by Verda J. Glick

Deliver the Ransom Alone by Verda J. Glick is her exciting, frightening story of her husband Eli's kidnapping on the way back from a Friday evening preaching service at El Paste in El Salvador. Four young girls were also kidnapped. The kidnappers threatened that if they did not receive the huge ransom they demanded: one hundred colons, about eleven or twelve thousand dollars, they would kill him. They also required that the oldest son of Eli deliver the ransom alone. The story tells how Eli was tied, tortured, unable to move. Meanwhile Verda, the family and church friends in El Salvador and around the world prayed fervently. Eli was able to forgive his guard and eventually tell him about Jesus. Eventually all were



released but Eli wondered how God could make anything good about the whole event (Romans 8:28). The story tells how the traumatized girls survived and a counseling ministry was developed. Some years later the first new Christians were baptized in the El Paste Mennonite Church.

Christians in Cuba had prayed diligently for Eli and it was later possible for Eli to go to Cuba where he helped organize a Mennonite Church on the island. It is a thrilling story of God's provision and answers to many fervent prayers.
