PASTOR'S PEN

Recently I was with someone who was sharing a struggle. As they described their experience along with the resulting disappointment and hurt, I was pondering what to say and what I might do. As the person kept speaking, I remained quiet long enough to hear God say, just keep listening. I turned my focus back to listening to the person rather than deciding what I should say or do. When the person finished, to my surprise they declared, "thanks for listening, that is just what I needed." Later in the day, the person texted me to express gratitude as my listening provided them the space to discern their next steps and confidence to keep walking a good path. This experience confirmed my growing awareness that listening is much needed in our culture. I, like many, often feel the need to say the right thing or take action to help, when listening has a power all its own.

As we begin this season of Lent, I invite us to give up speaking and replace it with listening. James 1:19 declares "You must understand this, my beloved brothers and sisters: let everyone be quick to listen, and slow to speak." What if we went through Lent with the goal of learning to become quick to listen? To be quick is to be rapid, prompt or immediate. How many of us are immediate to listen? When struggles appear or problems are identified what would it look like to be quick to listen as our first and most important goal?

In a desire to be practical, I offer the following suggestions as specific times when it may prove wise to be quick to listen. As in my example, it is most helpful to listen first when hearing the struggles of another person. Beyond trying to help or provide a solution, commit yourself to listen above all else. A second opportunity to practice listening is when someone is saying something with which you disagree. Perhaps they have a different opinion or perspective. By listening intently, the other person will know you heard what they said and you may gain a deeper understanding. The final time I will mention is when we are being corrected or being provide unsolicited advice. Often in such times it is natural to be quick to defend, shut down and even attack.

Finally, if we are willing to try this Lent challenge of giving up speaking and replacing it with listening what might we experience. We just may experience less stress and more peace. When we engage people to listen rather than fix others we carry less anxiety. Secondly, we will discover improved relationships. As humans we cannot help but to be drawn to people who listen. Finally, we may just discover we gain more wisdom and a better understanding of others and our world. Often it is quite amazing to discover what is learned just by listening.

FROM THE LIBRARY: Book Review - Who is my Shelter, by Neta Jackson



<u>Who is my Shelter</u> by Neta Jackson is another Yada Yada House of Hope novel. Yada means "to know and be known." Characters in the story gather for prayer to share with each other about their struggles and pray for each other. Gabby is estranged from her husband Philip who has treated her abominably, shutting her out of their Penthouse apartment and taking the boys - she didn't know where. Philip has a gambling problem which caused his serious financial problems and led to serious injuries from those who were after money he owed. Philip has asked her to forgive him; she is having problems forgiving. At a worship service she is gripped by the song: "When trouble's around me, I can go to the Rock … Jesus, my waymaker … strong tower … heart fixer. I can go to the Rock." Another song, based on Psalm 91:

"He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty." She was touched by the thought, God is my everything! A shelter in the time of storm!

She and another staff person took some homeless women in Chicago on a retreat in Wisconsin. Participants were amazed at how dark it was at night and all the stars! Leaders read the story of Hagar who was also homeless but God spoke to her and knew her name. The leaders found a meaning for each of their names and wrote a blessing to give each one, which touched each of them.
