#### **PASTOR'S PEN**

We are a kingdom people, belonging to a sovereign God who invites us to share the message of his kindness and goodness in our world. Steve and I attended the Cross Gen conference in early January at Spruce Lake. The speaker, Terry Ishee, reminded us repeatedly that we have a calling as Kingdom people. It was an encouraging teaching as I thought about the many opportunities we all have to live in our world as kingdom people.

We need an <u>awareness</u> of the kingdom, of the goodness of God. How often do we find ourselves observing the kindness and goodness of people in our daily lives? Is that the kingdom of God being expressed? Are we aware of how widespread the goodness of God is? Habakkuk 2:14, "For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD as the waters cover the sea." I invite you to pray and ask God to open your "eyes" to see the goodness of God wherever you are.

God invites us to be <u>aligned</u> with his kingdom values. What are the practices in your life that help you to be aligned with the life of Jesus? As followers of Jesus, we need to follow (obviously ©), but we can only follow someone we know. Our invitation is to continue in relationship with Jesus to stay in step with his leading daily.

Thirdly God uses us to alert others to the kingdom of God and his goodness. This was a new thought for me. I often see evidence of God's love being shared but how often have I named it aloud? It may or may not be a person who is a follower of Jesus, but we know God's sovereignty works in numerous ways. Here is an example: This past Sunday morning I took a walk while it was raining in my neighborhood, I saw a person picking up the newspaper off the sidewalk in front of an elderly gentleman's home and putting it right on his doorstep. I realized it was my other neighbor doing this kind deed on a rainy morning. Later I texted him and shared my appreciation for the way he was sharing God's love in our neighborhood. The Holy Spirit made me aware that this was just a small example of the kingdom of God being expressed and I had an opportunity to "alert" my neighbor to his participation in God's work in our world.

This is very connected to our theme this year of being sent with power and authority. We have been given a wonderful opportunity to declare it aloud when we see the goodness of God in our homes, our workplaces, our neighborhoods, our schools, etc. I pray for courage and boldness to open our mouths and alert others to the ways God is showing up to spread his glory over the whole earth. May we as a faith community grow in authority and power as we participate in proclaiming the goodness of God for God's glory.

#### **SPECIAL EVENTS**



A recent addition to our library is a book by Liz Curtis Higgs called <u>Bad Girls of the Bible</u> and what we can learn from them. Some made a bad choice like Eve; others had made a series of bad choices like the woman at the well. One, a "Christian" (Sapphira), lied about their contribution to the "church" treasury and died. I liked the story of Rahab. In Joshua 2 we read that Rahab said to the Israelite spies, "the Lord your God is God in heaven above and on the earth below." She courageously spared their lives and they promised kindness to her and her family. Her courageous act earned her a spot in the Hebrews honor roll. The author highlights, "With God, it isn't who you <u>were</u> that matters; it's who you <u>are becoming</u>. She ended up being an ancestor to David. Each chapter has a section called "What lessons can we learn

from ... "and then finally "Good girl thoughts worth considering." There are lots of footnotes and scriptural references. It is a good, entertaining and thought-provoking read.
