PASTOR'S PEN

Once again we welcome a new year by naming a theme for the year. Our 2024 theme is based on Luke 9:1-2 and will focus on Jesus giving power and authority to the disciples. I am excited to focus on the many aspects and implications surrounding authority for the next year. I look forward to exploring and discussing the purpose and significance of having a common understanding and practice of authority. I may even be so bold as to suggest that the lack of such has greatly crippled both the church and society.

My energy regarding authority was fueled during 2023 when our DMC Care Team chose to read the book Strong and Weak by Andy Crouch. The premise of this book suggest that we flourish as individuals and a community when we experience both authority and vulnerability. This unique mix of power and weakness may seem odd but I believe has much to consider. Besides the Care Team, I have read this book with several other individuals, each time learning and appreciating more what the author has to say.

Like the discussion of which comes first the chicken or the egg, we may ask the same regarding authority and vulnerability. I have decided that a solid understanding and practice of authority is needed. Hence, I will focus our attention on authority for 2024. Jesus and the

entire Bible has much to offer on this topic so I look forward to what we can learn as we journey through 2024.

Perhaps a simple definition by help us get started. In his book, Crouch suggests that authority is the ability to impact a given situation, the capacity to act in such a way that causes change. According to a dictionary, authority is the power to determine, adjudicate, or otherwise settle issues or disputes. It is the right to command, control, or determine. Often it is a right delegated or given. You may recall the many times the religious leaders questioned the source of Jesus' authority.

As we begin 2024, I invite you to consider the following questions.

How do you understand authority?
Where do you practice authority?
What is the source of authority?
Where do you lack authority?
When do you submit to authority?.

Let us enter 2024 on a journey of seeking to understand and practice authority in a way that enables both individuals and community to flourish.

We too are called to live lives of authority and vulnerability. We read an article by Hendy Matahelemual, Mosaic pastor in South Philadelphia, entitled, "As a Leader I am Tempted." Hendy writes about the temptation to be powerful and relevant, but also describes the need to be vulnerable with his congregation so together they can grow in relationship.
