PASTOR'S PEN

Welcome to 2025! As I have done for the past several years, I once again have identified a theme to guide our community life together. This year's theme is "Listening to and practicing the words of Jesus: our rock and firm foundation" centered on Matthew 7:24 and I Corinthians 3:10-11. Throughout the year, we will focus on various aspects of this theme. The overall hope is to increasingly center our individual and community life together on Jesus.

At we begin this journey, I think it is important to identify the many competing interests that seek our attention that we may confuse as providing a solid foundation. Some things that come to mind include securing financial stability, obtaining a good education, maintaining good health, and having good marital/family relationships. All of these are worthy and merit our attention; however, they cannot take the place of or compete with our loyalty to Jesus. The challenge is to recognize that these things cannot provide the rock solid foundation that is available through Jesus.

It is therefore essential that these other things are pursued recognizing our sole dependency on Jesus. Unfortunately, we frequently only discover that we look to other things to provide a foundation when we lose or feel threatened that we could lose them. For example, it is when we take a hit financially that we suddenly discover the extent to which we trust wealth for our security. The same can be said when our health fades or begins to fail us.

At times our prayers indicate our desire to have multiple foundations. We pray asking God to direct things so that our health remains strong or our finances secure. Perhaps such prayers demonstrate that we want God to provide tangible signs in our physical world to build our confidence? Do we trust God or do we trust in the outcomes we desire God to provide?

If we are to increase our confidence in Jesus as our rock and foundation, we need to identify and remove other sources we rely on for a foundation. What do you look to in order to provide confidence that makes you feel secure? Will you ask God to show you anything that hinders you from placing your sole foundation on Jesus?

FROM THE LIBRARY: Book Report - From Word to Book, by Nancy R. Heisey



Adam and Eve didn't keep a journal of their visits with God as they walked with him in the garden, Abraham's tent didn't have an office desk, we don't have pictures of the stone tablets where God wrote the ten commandments for Moses, or a recording of the other words he spoke to him. Jesus didn't have a secretary who took down his sermons in shorthand, newspapers didn't send reporters to travel with him. So, how did we get the Word of God as we know it today? Nancy Heisey researched the answers to some questions her college students were asking about the Bible and put ten of them together in this book. Some of the questions are: What does it mean to read the Bible in translation; How did ancient stories become Hebrew scrolls;

How do archaeological findings enhance the Bible's backstory; What are Bible canons and how were they formed; and finally, How does the Bible speak, and to whom?

Reading this book requires time for thought. The historical information in this book will expand your understanding of what a remarkable book we hold in our hands, and how it came to us as the Word from God himself.
