PASTOR'S PEN: Thinking Like Christ

Steve and I were present at DMC on Friday night, June 27, to offer any assistance for a

group activity from A Woman's Place. Their young adult volunteers hosted an outdoor movie night in our pavilion. We were welcomed to watch the movie with the families and teenagers present, an enjoyable experience on a lovely summer evening. It was good to see the pavilion and playground being used with enthusiasm!

The movie, Inside Out 2, portrays a young adolescent coping with the changes brought about by puberty in her body and her brain. Her relationships go through turmoil as she tries to sort out her identity. One major theme in the movie is her set of beliefs about herself and how her beliefs, her way of thinking drives her behavior. Anxiety plays a big role.

The way we think about ourselves and God is a key part of how we live. Our scripture focus for July is from Romans 12:1-3, where Paul invites us to be transformed by the renewing of our minds. Our thinking is what guides our actions. In the movie, Riley, the main character, moves from a pattern of thinking that comes from being loved and loving others to a pattern of fear and anxiety due to skewed beliefs about herself. "I am not good enough." "I have to fit in." The movie is worth the watch, no spoiler alert here! God invites us to take on God's way of thinking, the mind of Christ, so that our beliefs will be aligned with God's beliefs about us. When we submit to God's way of thinking, our actions will reflect a pattern that is an act of worship, just like it says in Romans 12. Because we have all been impacted by sin, we need to be transformed in our thinking. I don't see this as condemnation, but as an invitation to be renewed and restored. God has beauty in mind when he created us and that beauty is reflected in the body of Christ as we offer ourselves in service.

This scripture also says we need to think of ourselves with an honest evaluation based on how much faith God has given us, not to put ourselves up on a pedestal. The text goes on to highlight the value each of us has in the body of Christ, a message we heard so well in June from Ted Ewing.

As we pray during the month of July using the prayer focus of Romans 12, I invite us to consider how God thinks about us. I invite us to turn to God and ask God to direct our thoughts so that we are living out of truth and not lies about who we are.

May we each have our minds transformed by the renewing and transforming work of the Spirit in our midst.

FROM THE LIBRARY: Book review - Secrets of the Cross Trilogy

Elizabeth Musser has written this trilogy as a historical novel with accurate detail about the Algerian revolution to win their independence from France. Book 1, Two Crosses, happened in the 8 years, prior to when Bill and I were working in Algeria under MCC. We heard stories of the blood shed during those years. The book gives us examples of how lives were effected on both sides of the Mediterranean Sea. She uses families separated, children smuggled to an orphanage, friends helping strangers and lovers. By the end of the book, I felt like the characters were people I knew. The book is hard to put down as the Christian values and political loyalties are tested in the many twists this story goes through.



Book 2, Two Testimonies, and book 3, Two Destinies, are next on my list to read. They will then be available in the church library. Since we spent 1965-1968 in Algeria, these books are probably more exciting to me. I do recommend Two Crosses to anyone who enjoys historical novels and details about the lives of people living through a long, bloody revolution.
