

God of the Underdogs by Matt Keller is a challenge to anyone who may sometimes feel like an underdog. The subtitle of the book is "When the odds are against you, God is for you." Keller uses Biblical characters to demonstrate different excuses not to do something, i.e. Jacob whose reputation was too scarred, Moses who was insecure, Gideon whose resources were too scarce, David who felt unqualified, Paul whose past was too bad, John the Baptist whose dream was too radical.



MY SUMMER AT SPRUCE LAKE

For those of you who don't know, I worked this summer as a counselor at Spruce Lake Day Camp in the Pocono Mountains. God provided for and protected our ministry this summer in ways that I cannot express in words. However, I do hope that this story will give you a taste of how God was working at Spruce Lake this summer:

One way we encouraged good behavior in my Day Camp group was our sticker chart. Kids earned stickers for doing kind things like holding doors, sharing, and using good manners. After earning five stickers, campers could pick from the golden prize box. The prize box had yo-yos, bouncy balls, toy cars, parachute toys, and lots of other exciting items. In addition to those items, the prize box also had pocketsize Bibles. On his last day of camp, one of my campers picked a Bible from the prize box. He flipped through the pages, and I noticed how small the words were. I asked him if he had a bigger Bible at home, and he told me that he didn't. I offered to give him a bigger Bible that he could keep and take home with him. Because he was still learning to read, he wanted to know if the Bible would have pictures. I told him that I could find him one with pictures. He dropped to the floor with excitement, and pure joy washed over his little face.

When I came back to our room with a Bible in-hand, the first thing my camper wanted to know was which picture in the Bible was God. He wanted to see and know God. Oddly enough, my camper had opened up to the story of Moses. Since "Pharoah, Pharoah" is a Day Camp song favorite, I sang a little bit of the tune to him and showed him which picture was Pharoah and which was Moses. I told him the whole story of crossing the Red Sea and pointed out each of the characters in the pictures. My camper watched and listened attentively.

As a counseling staff, we are taught that we will not always get to see the fruit of our labor. We are merely planting seeds. However, there are moments that remind us of the powerful impact we can have on our campers and how God is moving in and through us. This was certainly one of those moments. And while my camper did not see a picture of God in his Bible, I was certainly seeing God as I had that conversation with him.
