PASTOR'S PEN: The Art of Listening

God has blessed us with several senses with which to learn from our environment, touch, taste, smell, seeing and hearing. We use these senses every day, often without even thinking about it. Perhaps when we struggle with hearing or seeing well, we are more aware of how valuable these senses are in our daily lives.

The sense of hearing is related to the art of listening because we need the physical ability to hear what another person is saying to listen to them. However, I would suggest that we also need our heart and mind to listen to another person. It is not always an easy task to really listen to the other, particularly when we might disagree with them or think we have advice to offer. There are many times when listening involves paying attention to a person's body language, their tone of voice and countenance.

I have been challenged by a billboard in my travels on 309 these last few months with a photo of two girls who look like twins with their backs to each other and their heads together, with the tag line: *"The other person might be right." LISTENING* I really appreciate this message because it is a reminder to consider the perspective of others. Randy will be sharing a series of messages this month on the posture of humility with the purpose of

encouraging us to live in dependence on God, demonstrating a Christ-like attitude as we interact with others. Listening is just one of the ways we demonstrate humility. As we listen to each other, the invitation is to listen with a goal of understanding rather than just formulating my response to what they are saying. I have noticed that listening with compassion and kindness builds a sense of community with my neighbor. Jesus calls us to love our neighbor as ourselves. When we stop to listen to the other person, we will be open to learning. We may have to set aside our agenda to be more fully present with the other person. One place we can all start is to learn to listen to ourselves and to identify what we are feeling and thinking. That may help us to love our neighbor well too.

As we go through this season of elections and change, the encouragement for us all is to practice loving our neighbors as ourselves through the art of listening. No, we will not always agree, but the very act of listening well to the other may be a spiritual practice that helps us lean into God's love for our neighbor. May the posture of humility be evident in our relationships as we share life together.
